Power Plant Ready to Furnish Power

The dam of the Young Harris Power Co., which was completely destroyed last summer by high water, has been reconstructed by the citizens of Young Harris and community is just completed, the power line completed and is in excellent condition, new copper wire of correct voltage being used throughout the line. The citizens who use this current in their homes should go over the wiring carefully, which might prevent fire, the wires having been unused so long that some of them might be exposed.

The generator for this plant has been lost for sometime on the road, but has at last reached Young Harris, and the plant will be ready to furnish lights immediately.

This will add considerably to our town as well as the college, as practically every citizen in town uses this power.

Mr. Gus Townsend who has been in charge of the construction work says he feels quite sure that the high water cannot break this dam. It was under construction last summer when it was broken by the floods.

Thousands of Gallons of Whiskey Destroyed

Several thousand gallons of illicit whiskey, together with 36 copper stills were destroyed by federal prohibition officers in Georgia this week as reported by Mr. Dismukes, chief director for Georgia.

Head of Highway Board to Control All Appointments

During the confusion on the last night of the recent session of the legislature a bill was passed which virtually empowers the chairman of the state highway commission to make all appointments in the state highway department and to fix the salaries of the appointees it was discovered at the capitol Thursday.

The bill as originally introduced by Representative Smith of Meriweather, purported to be a bill to abolish the position of special counsel for the state highway department. Somehow in the house or senate an amendment was tacked onto the bill which clothes the chairman of the highway department with authority to name all engineers and others connected with the department. Under the law creating the department authority to select the district engineers and other employees was vested in the state highway engineer.

An investigation of the manner in which the amendment was tacked on was made Thursday and no information could be obtained as to how it was passed. It is sighed by the speaker of the house, the president of the senate and the governor, but the bill does not show on its face who introduced the amendment or when it was passed.

Through the passage of the bill control of the patronage of the highway department passes virtually to the governor. The governor has the authority to name the chairman of the highway department and the chairman has the authority now to appoint all engineers and employees. John N. Holder, an appointee of Gov. Thos. W. Hardwick, is now chairman of the state highway department.

The amendment provides that the highway board shall be empowered to make the appointments and when it is not in session such authority is vested in the chairman. The board meets only at infrequent intervals and this virtually gives authority to the chairman of the state highway board.
