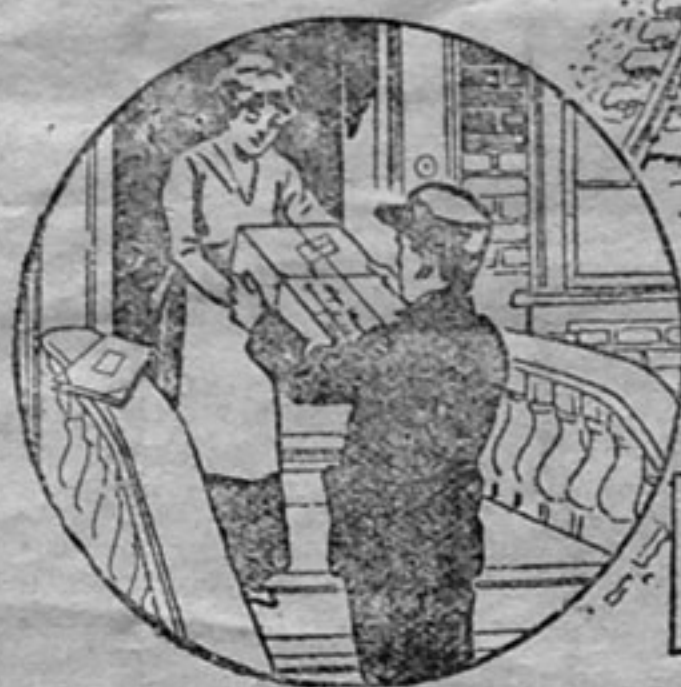

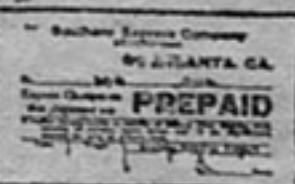

A Myth That Will Not Die

By Dr. A. M. Scull.

Never in the history of the south has cotton seed brought so royal a price as during the present season. In fact, the prices attained have so far surpassed those previously recorded that the time seems nearly a century ago when Edward Atkinson, of New England, must have been thinking of the cotton seed as a waste. He said that his section of the country would be willing for the cotton seed to be the lint of cotton, provided New England might have the right to manufacture that generous variety of by-products for the use of man and beast now so well and favorably known in every part of the civilized world. The increased price of cotton seed has been such as to add an equivalence in value in many instances of as much as one to two cents to each pound of lint produced on the average farm. Cotton seed has thus become an economic factor of the greatest importance to the south.

Under the circumstances, one would think that the farmer would clearly and quickly recognize that it is to his best interests to sell his seed on the market. He prefers to retain it with the idea of exchanging it for some other thing, or on the public in general, and depriving themselves in some way of the substantial profit to which they are justly entitled. No clear or definite reason can be assigned for this position, and if there is a good one, the writer has not been able to ascertain it.

Cotton Seed Meal Versus Cotton Seed

One hundred pounds of cotton seed contain 13.3 pounds of digestible protein, 23.6 pounds of digestible carbohydrates and 16.5 pounds of digestible fat. A ton of seed, therefore, contains 266 pounds of digestible protein, 472 pounds of digestible carbohydrates and 330 pounds of digestible fat. One hundred pounds of choice cotton seed meal contain 37 pounds of digestible protein, 21.8 pounds of digestible carbohydrates, and 8.6 pounds of digestible fat. A ton of choice meal therefore contains 740 pounds of digestible protein, 236 pounds of digestible carbohydrates and 172 pounds of digestible fat. There is not a farm in the south which is not, relatively speaking, well supplied with an abundance of those food elements known as carbohydrates and fat, and which are primarily concerned in the production of heat and energy. There is hardly a farm, however, which is reasonably well supplied with the element known as protein, and which is concerned in the formation of flesh, the maintenance of nervous energy, and the proper development of muscles, skin, ligament, horn, hair and bone. Naturally, protein is a high-priced and difficult element to obtain. It is not essential for the proper maintenance of live stock, the question of the proper nutrition of animals would be materially simplified, and the farmer would rarely, if ever, find it necessary to purchase concentrated animal feeding materials. As it is, it is seldom possible for the average farmer, and particularly in the south, to produce all the concentrates needed, even under the wisest systems of farm management, which, as we all know, are not followed on many of our farms.

Most Protein At Lowest Cost

The question therefore resolves itself into what the farmer can purchase which will give him the largest possible supply of protein at the lowest relative cost. It appears from the figures quoted that a ton of choice cotton seed meal contains almost three times as much protein as a ton of seed. True, it contains only about half as much carbohydrates and fat as the seed, but, as already explained, these are not difficult or costly elements to obtain. Hence, if cotton seed were as desirable a food to feed to live stock as cotton seed meal, the farmer would still have to feed three tons of seed to secure the same protein equivalent obtained from one ton of seed meal. With cotton seed selling at \$35.00 a ton, the farmer would have to invest \$105.00 to obtain the protein equivalent in one ton of meal. This will not cost him more than \$35.00. In addition he will have wasted a great deal of fat and energy to no purpose, and will be poorer as the result of this practice by \$70.00.

From the standpoint of the maintenance of animals, there is no reason why cotton seed should be kept on the farm. In fact, the large quantity of seed which contains makes its use as a foodstuff undesirable, a fact which has been pointed out over and over again. Moreover, the seed does not combine with satisfaction with the great variety of foodstuffs available on the average farm. On the other hand, the meal can be combined with any of these foodstuffs with advantage, and when fed to live stock the part of its plant food content is voided, and the manure, if properly cared for, as it can and should be, becomes a source for enriching the soil of the farm, and therefore maintaining its fertility. It is true the farmer may think that the seed contains some plant food, and in this he is right, but never by any stretch of the imagination can the fat content of the seed be made to approximate more than half the fat content of the plant food content of a ton of meal.

Cotton Seed Meal Greatly Preferred

These facts seem to make it clear that cotton seed is possessed of no great virtue as a foodstuff; in fact, that the meal is much to be preferred to the seed on the average farm and with the class of live stock we maintain on the farm. From any point of view, the retention of the seed on the farm can only be accomplished under existing conditions at a monetary loss to the owner, and the deprivation of the world of a human food material in the form of cotton seed oil which is of the greatest importance to our rapidly increasing population and the return of which to the soil through the use of seed directly as fertilizer a detriment and not a benefit.

PROGRESSIVE RURAL LEADERSHIP NEEDED

Andrew M. Scull, President Georgia State College Of Agriculture

What are you doing as an individual citizen in your community to aid its development and progress? Probably there is more opposition to the rural districts to the introduction and establishment of new industries elsewhere. This is in part due to the isolation which obtains in the open country, and to the fact that the farmer must depend on his own judgment, and, therefore, formulate his own opinions about most questions. It is unfortunate, however, that there should be any prejudice against agricultural education or against agricultural science, for only through the agency of science can we discover new truths upon which a permanent type of practice is based. As a matter of fact, it has been extremely difficult to induce many farmers to use preventive serum for the control of hog cholera. A long and bitter fight has been waged to get rid of the cattle tick, and it is only recently that a substantial degree of progress has been witnessed. Farmers have been opposed to the introduction of new and labor-saving implements. They have said, for instance, that draft horses could not be maintained successfully on our farms. They have thought that beef cattle could not be raised profitably. The dairy industry has been neglected because of the change in methods of management and practice it involves. As many of our boys have not been sent to college as should have been because of the general belief that agricultural education was not worth while. Insects have been allowed to leoplate our field and plant diseases to ravage our crops because the suggestions made relative to the control of diseases and insects were thought to be impractical by the average farmer.

These conditions do not represent the ideals of the constructive type of citizenship. The failure to utilize the stores of knowledge at the command of the farmer holds back progress and militates against the development of the community. The good citizen endeavors to inform himself about such matters and to aid in their wide dissemination. Are you a good citizen? If not, think this matter over seriously and assume that position of leadership and that place of responsibility among your neighbors which will enable them to secure all the knowledge available concerning their profession.

Dairying and Soil Fertility

W. H. Howell, Dairy Expert, Georgia State College Of Agriculture

A ton of wheat at \$1.00 a bushel is worth \$33.33, and removes \$8.59 worth of soil fertility from the soil. Corn at 80c a bushel is worth \$23.56 a ton and removes fertility worth \$8.60. A ton of cotton seed meal is worth \$31.92 for fertilizer. A ton of butter, on the other hand, at 20c a pound, is worth \$60.00 and contains only 64 cents' worth of fertility. The only element of fertility in butter is the small amount of nitrogen found in the curd.

A dairy cow voids about 12 tons of solid and liquid manure in a year. Many experiments have shown that it is worth from \$2.59 to \$3.50 a ton in increased crop yields.

The dairy man must have pasture and hay land. His soil does not wash and gradually increases in fertility.

Every garden spot in our state is an example of the value of barnyard manure.

Home Landscape Gardening

T. H. McHatten, Professor Of Horticulture, Georgia State College Of Agriculture

Fall and winter are suitable for planting trees and shrubs on the home grounds. Put the shrubs about the base of the house, the corners of walks, intersections of roads, around edges and in the corners of the lawn, but never in its center.

Avoid straight lines in planting. Good shrubs to use are the various spiraea, barberry, privets, cape jasmine, tea olive, various crataegui, English laurel, narrow leaf evergreens, arbor vitae and junipers.

Shade trees should be planted around the lawn, along the walks, at the intersection of roads, walks. Oaks are very desirable, water, live and pin oaks being excellent. Magnolias, maples, particularly Norway maples, sycamore, in certain sections, elms, and evergreen trees such as deodora cedar, Himalayan pine and ordinary pines may be planted.
